

1998 International Seniors Quartet Champions


Finally--yet suddenly--after a century-plus of barbershop harmony experience and 250 years on the planet, this foursome evolved into the Jurassic Larks Quartet in July 1997. Just a few weeks later, they won the Central States District Seniors Quartet Championship. This achievement qualified them to represent the district in the Barbershop Harmony Society's International Seniors Quartet Contest, in Tampa, Florida, in January 1998. There, the Jurassic Larks won the championship on their first try, besting 25 other quartets from around the United States and Canada.

Since then, the Larks have been dazzling (?) audiences young and old in 18 states with their home-grown parodies to otherwise respectable popular songs and barbershop standards. They feature the finest in tailored costumes (leisure suits), plus a highly animated (?) choreography that folks really appreciate. Rave reviews of the Larks have gone so far as to describe them as "the cat's meow," "catatonic," "comatose;" "warped," "almost funny," "awesome," "awful"--whatever.

Victor Neilsen, tenor, and Barney Alleman, bass, are very retired--reportedly doing absolutely nothing constructive. Victor had been a division manager of vocational rehabilitation and Barney had been an insurance executive. Vince Yinger, recently retired, had been, for what seemed like an eternity, an infernal auditor at one of Iowa's state agencies. G.W. Lewallen, baritone, is semi-retired-self-employed as an artistic graphic designer. He paints signs. The four have all been members of the Des Moines, Iowa Barbershop Chorus for more than 20 years but they had never sung together as a quartet until the Larks were hatched in 1997. They've been singing "Together" together ever since.


